Amelia says, "I truly believe that, with the education from Davis Tech, you will succeed. You have the skills, you have the knowledge, and you will succeed."







GIFT CHANGES LIVES



Since then, the yearly payments the Foundation has received from this gift have totaled \$1,000,000. FINANCIAL AID AWARDS



REMOVING BARRIERS WITH SCHOLARSHIPS AND FINANCIAL AID

We know that **students who receive financial aid are twice as likely to graduate** compared to students who do not receive funding. Therefore, the Office of Scholarships and Financial Aid has been working closely with the Davis Technical College Foundation to substantially increase the amount of funding and the number of students awarded.

To remove barriers, we've simplified the scholarship form and increased marketing to get the message out about FAFSA. Due to these efforts, an increase in enrollment, and working personally with each student, the team has increased FAFSA submissions by 13.6% over the last two years.
